- What are your top three priorities for services that you would like to see in the new Tribal complex?
- Would you like to have a resource/cultural center?
- Do you see a need for a Tribal library and genealogy research center? Would it be beneficial to have a person/department whose main objective is accessing the needs of a member before ever being sent to a program for help?
- Would this help to limit unnecessary meetings with departments that cannot contribute help?
- Please give examples of your vision of communication on how to best connect Choctaw people with services needed that would be most most efficient in the new Tribal complex.
- What native cultural aspects do you feel should be represented?
- What type of atmosphere should be displayed for visitors passing through that would give a sense of who the Choctaw people are and what we stand for as well as the Nation as a whole?

Answers are sought after and can be submitted to the community center on Wednesdays. Survey sheets can be requested by calling 580.326.3528. Another survey was conducted in Choctaw County during the Communities Empowering Youth training recently, about the types of volunteers we see in our area. An examination was given to our 10 to 14 year-old age group. This group serves in livestock care, fundraising, cheer clubs, tutoring, ministry activities, community service at all levels, sports and caregiving for younger age groups. Four Goodland students worked hard during the "Trash Offs" on the southern end of Choctaw County. This is the gateway into our county coming from Texas.
